Update on September article: The global textile industry is undergoing a step change called the 'Second Wave'. The 'Third Wave' is coming, the industry needs to prepare itself with a commensurate policy response.

The results of the 11th Corona-Survey show that inflation is expected to remain high beyond 2022. However, observing a scenario like the Great Inflation in the 1970s is unlikely. Once the logistical issues are resolved and the pent-up demand gone, demand and supply should find themselves

at an equilibrium close to pre-pandemic conditions.


